Dear Friends,

During our staff devotions we have been working our way through the letters of Peter and John.

One passage that I felt was very important to us at this time (well, at all times) is John's encouragement to love one another. While there is some conjecture over whether the dear lady in 2 John is a metaphor for the whole church, or John is writing to a specific woman in church leadership, his words need to be heard afresh today...

"And now, dear lady, I am not writing you a new command but one we have had from the beginning. I ask that we love one another. And this is love: that we walk in obedience to his commands. As you have heard from the beginning, his command is that you walk in love."

(2 John v5,6)

In this you hear the echo of Jesus words that John would have heard reclining by his side at the last supper: "If you love me keep my commandments" (John 14: 15), "A new commandment I give unto you that you love one another as I have loved you." (John 13:34). Even John's play on the words this is not a new commandment make me think these words of Jesus were indelibly etched on John's memory. You can't help but think of the sermon on the mount and Jesus teaching about how we treat one another finishing with the parable of the two builders, and Jesus saying that one who builds on the solid foundation is the one who, "hears my words and obeys them".

In our increasing fractured world how we love one another, our commitment to each other and treatment of each other is going to be a vital witness to Christ in our community. How we deal with differences of opinion, and the actions and consequences of those differing views, and how we deal with conflict.

I guess this passage has stuck with me because COVID has and will continue to throw up challenges to our commitment to love one another. I've had a letter sent to me that said if Pastors promote vaccines to their congregation, they are guilty of genocide and crimes against humanity. I also know people who for sincere reasons are resisting being vaccinated. Some questions ahead will be...How as a church do we welcome everyone and still protect the vulnerable? How do we balance individual rights with corporate responsibility... Maybe I'm borrowing some of tomorrows worries for today, but the basis for how we go forward is the commandment to love one another.
