Dear Friends,

I went out to the surf lifesaving club side of the Ruakaka estuary on Monday. We are blessed to have such a wonderful bird sanctuary so close to the city. I spent some time taking photos of Kuaka (bar tailed Godwits) and Huahoa (Lesser or Red Knotts) that come from Alaska and Sibera in winter (in our summer) here in New Zealand. It was low tide so they had flown as a flock down to the flat sand bar at the river mouth. It was the first time I had seen these birds up close so that was very exciting.

Then I walked back up to the sand dune and was very privileged to see a Tuturiwhatu chick (New Zealand Dotterel). They are quite hard to spot as they are so small and their coloring means they blend in with the stones, driftwood and seaweed on the sand. You usually just become aware of them because this tiny fuzzy dot will all of a sudden move. Plus Mum and Dad stood close by eyeballing me and trying to keep Junior from running in my direction.

The chick seemed so small and insignificant amidst the vastness of the sand bank. The chick then walked down to the waters edge on the riverside of the sand to see if it could get something to eat amidst the foam that was accumulating there. After a while I watched it make its way back up the steep sand bank. I took a series of photos of its ascent which I have called determination. I couldn't help but think of the words of Psalm 121 (itself a Psalm of ascent) which speaks of the journey of a pilgrim back to Jerusalem, across the vast desert, looking at how much of the journey is to come and that last part up the hills of Judea through the dangerous road up from Jericho (Jesus set his parable



of the Good Samaritan there for a reason). This bird looking up beyond the bank was like us looking beyond the journey yet to come and putting our trust in the one who made heaven and earth. The psalmist talking of God's enduring presence to care and to guide just like the ever present attention of the parent birds.

In the end the chick got up the hill one step at a time and at quite a good pace. I know if it

had been me and the hill was of the same scale I'd of had difficulty. It is a good reminder of God's goodness and presence and help as we navigate life's upward slogs and sometimes seemingly desolate landscapes.

COVID Alert level 2

If you are anything like me you are sick of COVID however, as the country moves from an elimination strategy to a suppression strategy it is more important than ever that we work at preventing the virus from getting loose in our church community.

COVID symptoms are as follows:

New or worsening cough, sneezing and runny nose, fever, temporary loss of smell or altered sense of taste, sore throat, shortness of breath. Less common symptoms of COVID-19 may include diarrhoea, headache, muscle aches, nausea, vomiting, malaise, chest pain, abdominal pain, joint pain or confusion/irritability.

Close contacts and places of interest: If you have been at a place of interest or in close contact with people who have COVID please follow Department of health guidelines on testing and self-isolation.

If you have symptoms or have been in a place of interest or in contact with people with COVID please get tested.

The government says the best health advice is to get vaccinated.

Please contact the church office in that situation for pastoral support and to give us a heads up. We have fact sheets from the government website to help people know what they should do in those situations. We can help arrange grocery drop offs etc.
