On Friday I sent out a pastoral email around the move to Alert level Orange on the governments COVID suppression plan. Adrian Whale quipped with me at Men's Prayer breakfast that morning, "it's a very orange dawn today", sadly by the time I'd actually got his joke we have moved back into Red, at midnight on Sunday. It is very uncertain times. I've been blessed this week, in the midst of that, to have some encouragement from Psalm 62 shared with me by a friend and colleague.

My friend Ben Dykman is the minister at Greenlane Presbyterian Church and he shared Psalm 62 in his online devotion last week. Like all the psalms it is a very gritty and real prayer full both of the trouble of life and also in the midst of that dependence and trust in God. Ben wrote that in a time of uncertainty it is good to have a sure and certain hope, not based on circumstances or what we do or do not have but on the character of God. The Psalm starts (v1-7) with the Psalmist speaking of his own personal faith in the face of his own personal trouble. It finishes by encouraging his hearers to have the same hope in God (8-12). A hope as the psalmist says in verse 11 and 12 based on two facts he knows about God: Power Belongs to God (v11), that God is all powerful and sovereign, and that in God there is unfailing love (v12). God is for us, shown in the sending of his Son Jesus Christ, Jesus life, death and resurrection, and the pouring out of the Holy Spirit on all who believe. May you find that peace and shelter in God, may it guide and motivate, lead and guide all your actions and reactions.
