Dear friends,

In My devotions at the moment I am working through bible passages on harvest. They are encouraging, as they speak of that season when the endeavours of our labour come to fruition. In my reading this morning I looked at Luke's account of Jesus calling the disciples to come follow him and he would make them fishers of men (Luke 5:4-11). It is a passage that I instantly relate to. You see I'm not a great fisherman, in fact my fishing career consist mainly of standing by an estuary mouth with my line in the water for a few hours, catching nothing. In Luke that is Simon Peter's experience, they'd been out all night and hadn't caught a thing. I guess that's why they call it fishing not catching. Jesus tells them to go out into the deep, not the usual fishing technique of the day, and to let down their net over the other side of the boat, not the normal way of doing things and they get a catch that almost sank the boat. I remember a friend of mine having a similar experience in a dinghy on the Manukau, not because of the volume (number) of fish they caught but the volume of the fish (size) that they caught, a giant ray whose fins hung over the side of the boat and which literal had jumped into the boat. This Miracle (Peter's not my friends) caused him to admit he was a sinful man and in need of salvation and then willingly accepting Jesus call to 'follow him, and he would make them fishers of men." They could trust Jesus after that demonstration of his power.

As a church it can often feel like the start of this bible passage. We feel like we've been fishing all night and haven't really caught much. We do things the way we've always done them. It can even be that the weather conditions are against us as well, like the storm over the weekend or the COVID season we are having to weather. Things like last year's Alpha course give us a glimpse of what is possible. However, the call is for us to keep listening to Jesus, his call to go out into the deep, take risks, be brave, follow him, and to be willing to do new things, let down our nets on the other side. Our Mission plan and process says that mission starts with listening. Listening to the voice of Jesus, listening to our neighbours, and community for that voice, and being prepared to respond and step out. At present it seems that Jesus has been whispering to us about the way forward about following him into the deep. And we are working through some possibilities: a child and family worker, expanding the central city chaplaincy, exploring a fresh expression of church to plant alongside Hope, even possibilities of a vision for the business block. They are whispers at the moment, faint callings that need to be listened to, checked for the voice of Jesus, and as we explore them I believe we will find places where as a church we will be lead to let down our nets and start the work of harvest...

Connect Groups at Hope Whangarei

At Hope, we value relationships. The new Testament has something like 35 "one another's" in it ... "love one another; encourage one another; build one another up; pray for one another" etc. One of the ways we can get to know one another more beyond gathered worship on Sundays, is to be in a connect group.
