Dear friends

In the face of international events we often feel helpless. One of the things that mass media has done for us is it has made things like the war in Ukraine very immanent and real. We see it each day in news casts, it swamps our social media feeds, and it invades our thoughts. I recently saw an interview with the head of World Vision on the border of Ukraine and Romania providing care for refugees escaping the escalating violence. He said, that we don't need to feel helpless, rather we should feel hopeful. That hopefulness should spur us on to act in the face of the crisis rather than to simply react emotionally. Here are a couple of ways that you can do that.

First is pray: Prayer changes things

I want to commend Lorne's initiative to you, of opening the doors of HopeCentral for people to come and pray for Eastern Europe between 12 and 1pm Monday to Friday. There are some resources there that will help you in that endeavour. We can pray by ourselves but gathering to pray (as much as we can with that other bully COVID around) allows us to know we are not alone, we are part of what God is wanting us to do. Bring our broken hurting world to him.

Secondly, the man from World Vision spoke of providing resources, giving, for the care and concern for those affected by this war. Be it through World Vision or other aid agencies. I was moved by a report of a Syrian refugee settled now in Germany driving across Europe to help this new flood of refugees, because he knew what they were going through, and he had received similar care himself.

Thirdly, you can join your voice to the many who are condemning the actions of Russia and calling for an end to the invasion. Be it online or by writing to the consulate here. Not to condemn a people but to call for peace and a restoration of right relationship.

On another matter, I must admit that I have found the book of Leviticus and all its laws quite hard to read. In my going through the bible in a year reading plan, Leviticus is the Old Testament reading at the moment. This morning's readings were from Leviticus 13:1-59. A chapter about the regulations around skin infections and I must admit it has never seemed more relevant to me. Yes, on a big scale it speaks of public health measures which were mandated to keep the community safe. But for me after Sunday I had arranged for a doctor's visit just to check up on my cellulitis, it is getting better but Kris wasn't happy about the progress. So the upshot is that I am back on antibiotics and have been told to keep my foot up and rest for the week. (I'm writing this from home in my office with a keyboard on my knees and my foot up on a kitchen chair). I was not happy about this, I want to get back to work. It was good in the reading of Leviticus to be reminded that the priests would check on the infections after seven days and if it hadn't improved greatly, they would decree another seven days isolation. I sensed the Spirit just confirming that this was the right course of action for me as well, so to rest into it and get well. So I'll be off work/working from home, this week. But I am contactable.

We often forget how important this ministry is – as one of our Council members texted today "Prayer is the only answer at the moment amidst the anarchy and madness". Spurgeon said "Prayer is the slender nerve that can move the muscles of The Almighty".

It was good to spend time with our service leaders on Saturday, in particular some new people who are taking on that role at Central.
