Dear friends,

I had to design a flyer for an autumn gathering last week and I had to stop and think about how do you represent a change of season in Northland from summer to autumn? I could of used the image of leaves falling and changing colour. While the fig tree in our garden had fruited and its leaves are browning and falling, when I look at the hills around us I am aware our native trees are evergreen and remain the same. I did wonder about the change in temperature. While the nights are starting to cool to a bearable temperature I was sitting in my office with the temperature about 25⁰. In the end, and not surprisingly I hear you say, I chose the image of terns who had gathered together in a flock after breeding season, a sure sign of the seasonal change.

On Saturday I went for a walk round the Onerahi foreshore and was surprised by another sign that summer is going and autumn is here. There on the line between sea and land were those wonderful large white birds. The kōtuku-ngutupapa, or Royal Spoonbills had returned after breeding season to winter in the harbour. And you also won't be surprised that there is a spoonbill photo with this email.

The change of seasons is part of creation and life, as it says in Genesis 8:22 " As long as the warmth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night will never cease'. It is a gift from God which allows the world to produce its bounty. But it is also a metaphor to talk about change. In Daniel 2:21 it says "He changes times and seasons, he deposes kings and raises up others. He gives wisdom and knowledge to the discerning." Many of you, I know, are wrestling with changes in the seasons of life, as you move from one life stage to another. Historically we have been through some season changes as well, after what has been quite a time of stability and calm we've moved into a stormy season of change and uncertainty: This pandemic, social unrest in New Zealand, the war in the Ukraine and even the fast pace of social reforms that have left us puzzled and bewildered or feeling that society is moving away from our Christian understanding of the world.

This pandemic has also been a season, and in particular wrestling with vaccine mandates has been a difficult season for us to deal with. I believe that season as well is changing. We still are in the midst of the omicron wave, it definitely cresting up here in Northland. But also we are going to see a change with mandates being removed, if not this week then soon. Like all seasonal changes, how we adjust and move into the next season is going to be challenging. Justin Duckworth, the dreaded Anglican Bishop of Wellington, talks of "two viruses that have plagued New Zealand the coronavirus and the virus caused by polarisation... a social virus we have unleashed on ourselves". That is a virus that has and does impact the church. So, what of this new season? What will it be like and what will we need for it? Firstly, like all the seasons of life, we will need to trust God to lead us through. Secondly, there is going to be a need for a lot of listening to one another, of not speaking past each other and there is going to be a need for a lot of grace and forgiveness, understanding and tolerance. Let us pray for the grace needed for this next season.
