Hi there everyone,

It's Lorne here. Howard is in hospital as I write after falling foul to another infection. After a time in ICU, he is now in Ward 3 in recovery mode with intravenous antibiotics to help fight the infection. He is on complete bed rest – a "mother hen" not even allowing his laptop to enter the Ward! He reports that "I'm ok - resting and being well looked after". Please pray for Howard and the family for a speedy and full recovery, and give thanks to all our medical and health workers who minister in our hospitals

So just a brief word to you all from me with Easter just around the corner.

"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God" Matthew 5:8

It's not often in the news that we hear good news. This past week I was overjoyed to read about a 19 year old Liberian boy called Emmanuel Tuloe. Last year, he was struggling to earn a living as a motorbike taxi driver when he found \$50,000 (£40,000) in a mix of US and Liberian notes, wrapped in a plastic bag by the side of the road. He could have easily pocketed this life-changing amount. But he gave it to his aunt to look after and when the rightful owner appealed on national radio for help in finding the cash, Emmanuel came forward.

Mocked by some for his honesty - people laughed at him saying he would die poor - his act earned him generous rewards including a place at Ricks Institute, one of Liberia's most prestigious schools. When his story came to light, President George Weah handed him \$10,000 and a local media owner also gave him cash, some of which was raised from viewers and listeners. And the owner of the money that was found donated \$1,500-worth of goods. On top of those and perhaps most significantly, a college in the US reacted by offering him a full scholarship once he had completed his secondary education.

When interviewed about his act of honesty, Emmanuel thanked God for giving him these rewards and he was also "grateful to my parents for teaching me to be honest"... "And my message to all young people is: It's good to be honest; don't take what does not belong to you." Looking at the future, he wants to study accounting at university "to prepare myself to help guide the use of the country's money". His prudence and honesty were seen as examples to follow in a country where allegations of corruption are rife and where officials are often accused of stealing state resources.

As we come to Easter, we recall especially a number of things about the <u>purity of the heart of Jesus</u>:

- 1. His desire to fulfil God's Word of prophecy as he entered Jerusalem on a colt (see Zechariah 9:9)
- 2. His cleansing of the Temple of the money lenders that were polluting the place of worship and prayer (Luke 19:45,46)
- 3. His refusal to defend Himself against unjust prosecution (Matthew 27:14) knowing that His "fate' was in His Fathers hands
- 4. His total obedience to God's will for His life by agreeing to go through the physical and spiritual agony of an horrendous crucifixion (Luke 22;41-45) where he was mocked by many (Mark 15:29-31)

This Easter let's rededicate our lives to God, asking God to <u>cleanse our own hearts of all impurities</u> that keep us from realising God's perfect will for our lives.
