Dear friends,

As well as being the season of creation on the Church calendar in New Zealand in September we have Maori language week, Te Wiki o te Reo Māori. Maori is one of the official languages in Aotearoa New Zealand and one of the signs that we are maturing as a nation is the growing desire to see it used more and more in everyday life. We are a nation founded on Te Tiriti o Waitangi, treaty of Waitangi, a genuine expression of partnership between tangata whenua, the people of this land, and settlers, being one people together. We still have a way to go in this area and many of us grew up in a time when this was not the reality that it is now. It has been easy to simply be silos in our own culture, but this is changing, and that's a good thing. Of course for the church this should not be something new as from its conception the church was a genuine mix of people from across the different divides of culture and society. That was a unique distinctive. Paul sums it up well in several of his epistles to churches wrestling with how to be this new people together. We are going to looking at Colossians in October and in chapter 3 verse 11 Paul sums it up like this - Here there is no Gentile or Jew, circumcised or uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave or free, but Christ is all, and is in all. You can imagine people coming together from so many different cultural backgrounds as they came to know Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, yes there was a lingua franca, a common language, konai greek, but also they would have had so many different heart languages and customs.

I am challenged by the need to grow in my use and understanding of Te Reo, as many of us are, and we are blessed in our church to have people who will share and encourage us in its use and who love us enough to gift us with their language and culture. When we have a blessing at the end of our pastoral email I try and have it in both English and Te Reo. It's helping me to recognize different words and phrases. For Pakeha people having something in writing makes it important. But for Maori hearing it spoken is the key thing. If you heard my message for the season of creation, consider the birds, you'll know I've got a long way to go, and thank you for those who took the time to encourage correct pronunciation. It's also important in Whangarei because as a city we have about 33% Maori in the community and if we are to be a flourishing Christian community, we should reflect that demographic. Being a flourishing Christian Community actually means that we grow multi-culturally to reflect the wonderful diversity of the People of God and universal nature of the gospel, and can I say *vive la difference*.
