We are leading into Easter this week, and much of my focus is on my message for Resurrection Sunday. This year during the season of Easter, stretching from Resurrection Sunday through to Pentecost, we are going to be looking at the accounts of the witnesses to the resurrection recorded in the gospels. Paul starts his long reflection on the resurrection in 1 Corinthians 15 with a list of witnesses, people and groups who met the risen Jesus. We are blessed to have many of the accounts of those witnesses' encounters with Jesus in the gospel. We also have accounts of people, mainly the women, who Paul does not mention in his list. As a first century Jew Paul would not consider women able to be witnesses in the legal arena, but of course they are the first to meet and proclaim Jesus risen from the dead. They also stand as evidence that the story of the resurrection was not made up as Val Grieve says in his book *Your verdict (on The Empty Tomb Of Jesus),* "If the story of Jesus appearance was made up it would start with Jesus appearing to a man- either one of his disciples, such as Peter, or even to his enemies such as Caiaphas, the high priest. "

But maybe I'm getting ahead of myself, looking at the empty tomb from this side of Easter. As I sat down to write the pastoral email this week, my eyes were drawn to a white pebble that sits on my desk, just beneath the monitor of the computer. A pebble which reminds me of the cross, and Christ's sacrifice for us.

When I was at Knox, twenty years ago, I went on a silent retreat at a catholic retreat centre in Oamaru. At one of the reflection sessions (when people could talk) a woman helping lead the retreat put a basket of stones in the middle of the group and invited us to select a rock. She said 'let the rock pick you, don't pick the rock'. Which I have to say, to me as a bloke, was a weird thing to say. It put me totally off. So I declined to be involved.

Anyway the next day I went for a long walk, through the town, out past where the blue penguins come ashore and down the wild coastline. It was a rocky beach and miles from anywhere I looked down and this pebble just stood out, it caught my attention, it was the white pebble on a beach of browns and greys. I had to laugh and say 'fair cop God'



as it was as if this pebble had chosen me. The white pebble of course is a biblical symbol, it is mentioned in Revelation 2: 17 as being given to those who overcome. In Roman society a white pebble was an indication of being found not guilty, being innocent... That is how it ties into Easter and the cross. Christ paid the price for the things we had done wrong, he made a way for us to have our sins forgiven the shame to be taken away for us to be declared not guilty and no longer under the power of sin and death.

The white pebble is a reminder for me of the great sacrifice Christ paid for us... as it says in Galatians 1:4 Jesus 'gave himself for our sins to rescue us from the present evil age, according to the will of our God and Father'.

Have a wonder filled Easter this year.

From resurrection Sunday through to Pentecost we will be exploring Paul's list of people and



groups who met the risen Jesus (1 Corinthians 15:3-8) and in particular looking at the gospel narratives of those encounters. I am hoping this will give us assurance of the physical resurrection of Jesus from the dead which is the central event of our faith and enable us to be confident in sharing this with people. In his Book the Verdict, UK lawyer and Christian Val Grieve says "A famous QC once said, 'when I have a poor case in court, I make a

long speech; but when I have a really strong case, I simply call the witnesses.'" For the resurrection the witnesses provide us with a strong case for its validity.


