I have finished going through the book of Ephesians for my daily devotions and have moved on to work through the Gospel of Mark using the '*Journey through*' series published by Our daily bread (if you want to access the series online here is the link <u>https://journeythrough.org/</u>). My daily reading today was Mark 1:9-13, Mark's account of Jesus baptism and temptation. One of the comments by Robert Solomon was the way in which at Jesus baptism the whole of the Godhead, the whole of the trinity, is seen to be involved in the baptism but also in our salvation. Jesus the son submits to baptism and shows his desire to be about God's purpose and plans. The Holy Spirit is sent to enable him to fulfil the mission he is called to do, being the Messiah, God's suffering servant. God affirms Jesus' identity; this is my Son in whom I am well pleased. This is encouraging when we think of how much God loves us and is working to see us bought back into a saving relationship with him. It is encouraging when we are looking at One Anothering in our services over these winter months, and we can see the trinity as this wonderful example of being united and working in total unity for the common good.

The Lord started to call me to be involved with missions as a teenager – while we were still in Singapore – so when we returned to NZ and I did my studies (including my Vet training), it was with the aim of going overseas to serve the Lord.

After working for several years as a vet in Westport, the opportunity arose for me to go to the Philippines and I started in full-time missions there in 1991 (this served as a missionary training time for me). In 1993 I felt the Lord was directing me to Mozambique and I spent a year in South Africa (1994) doing a health course for missionaries, so that I could translate some of my vet skills into human health care and especially health education.

In 1995 I started working in Mozambique, on a Tear Fund project involving health education and Bible teaching, and having worked with and trained a Mozambican couple to carry on that work, in 1997 I was invited, and felt the Lord's confirmation to join with the team starting up a Bible training centre in the same province – Volta à Bíblia (Back to the Bible). We began classes there in 1998, as an interdenominational centre, working with students sent by churches from a wide range of denominations and backgrounds, but with the aim of training faithful servants for the Lord's work, who have a real, living relationship with the Lord, understand and are guided by the Word of God, and are able to return to their sending churches to make a difference to the body of Christ.

Some of our students have also taken up the challenge of missions, serving the Lord outside their own tribe and culture, in northern Mozambique. My role at the Bible School at any time depends on the needs – whether as a Bible teacher, health adviser, kitchen supervisor, first-aid worker, vet or anything else that is needed.

Steph is currently in New Zealand and will be in Whangarei from 10th - 24th July. Steph will be at the Sunday Service at HOPECENTRAL on 16th July and will be available to share with Connect Groups etc during her time in Whangarei.
