Dear Brothers and Sisters,

From Wednesday through to Sunday the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Aotearoa New Zealand meet. This is the biennial national conference/ decision making body of our denomination. Lorne Campbell went as a commissioner from our parish this year and as a national intern Pauline Hampshire was there to learn the ropes.

I've asked Lorne to reflect on the Assembly... he writes.



The General Assembly was held at St Kentigern's College in Pakuranga Auckland - and boy was it cold! St Kentigern's is a Presbyterian School with the motto "Fides Servanda Est" - "the faith must be kept" ... and the cold weather reminded us of our Scottish roots! Our new

Moderator, Rev Rose Luxford was installed at the opening service and as I

walked down to the chapel (see photo left) for that service, the clouds parted and a triple beam of sunlight pierced through the gloomy evening (see photo right) - could this be a sign, I thought, of God's impending blessing upon or gathering? Overall, this Assembly could be described as very harmonious, good natured and of course - "decently and in order" (see photo below).





Rev Rose's theme for the Assembly and her two year moderatorship was / is "Authentic and hopeful in Christ". This is a theme that encourages us to be honest and real about the state of our churches and our state of mission, but at the same time remember that the resurrection of Jesus Christ reminds us that as we follow

the Holy Spirit's leading into missional endeavours, there is always hope!

Some of the highlights of the Assembly that affect us here in Whangarei were:

1. The decision to keep going with Nationally funded Internships so as not to drain the local churches purses.

2. The decision to change the PCANZ's national standard of 67% for all church buildings right throughout the motu (land), to the Government standard that has been applied to different regions according to their level of risk. This means that our buildings need to reach the 34% standard, not 67% that has until now been expected - I am sure that our BOM will let us all know the ramifications of that!

The actual motion passed was [23.052] That the Assembly request the Church Property Trustees to review and update the requirements of the earthquake-prone Buildings Policy (dated November 2022) and align their policy requirements pertaining to Earthquake Strengthening with those of the Building (Earthquake-prone Buildings Amendment Act 2016) and the relevant local authority.

3. It was agreed that the PCANZ recognise the 2022 Bi-lingual edition of Te Paipera Tapu as the preferred Bible in worship throughout the country. This Bible has both English and Te Reo side by side and will promote the shared nature of our mainly bi-cultural journey in NZ.

4. That the dialogue on sexuality, biblical morality, and leadership from the 2022 General Assembly continue and report back to the next General Assembly. There is of course a lot more that could be said about this - and many of us were grateful that this debate did not dominate the Assembly this year. One theme that came through from some speakers is that they are just tired of these issues continuing to crop up at Assemblies... every Assembly since 1985!



A very welcome Coffee cart was set up outside the gym where we met ... and it was very well attended (see photo left)!

There were of course many other things that were decided upon and debated at the Assembly - and if you are interested to learn more, we will post a link to the summary of all decisions when one is published...

One last comment from me! Prior to Assembly, Howard and I attended the one day AFFIRM conference at Greenlane Presbyterian. One of the most challenging sessions was Rev. Dr Mark Keown (Mark is the Director of Evangelistic Leadership at Laidlaw College) speaking about the "e-word" - yes ... evangelism ... and how we need to build a culture of evangelism in our churches. Whilst at Assembly I chatted with past moderator Richard Dawson and he asked me if I had heard about "Ripple effect evangelism" - which I hadn't. He is very excited about this Australian based ministry and encouraged us to consider it (they are coming to NZ and visiting his church in 2024) ... basically it is an equipping ministry to help Christians start conversations with people outside the faith, and building a culture of evangelism throughout the church.
